



Monthly review

March marked a sharp deterioration in the global financial landscape, representing a decisive reversal from the constructive tone observed at the start of the year. The key driver of the risk-off move was the outbreak of the conflict in Iran, with the direct involvement of international actors and, above all, the consequences for the world's most critical energy chokepoint: the Strait of Hormuz, through which approximately 20% of global oil supply flows. Against this backdrop, equity markets posted broadly negative and synchronized losses: the S&P 500 closed down 5.1% and the Nasdaq fell 4.8%, while Europe (STOXX Europe 600 -8.0%) and the UK (FTSE 100 -6.7%) showed greater sensitivity to the energy theme. Weakness was even more pronounced in Asia and emerging markets, with the TOPIX down 11.2% and the MSCI EM off 13.3%, reflecting both higher energy dependency and cyclical vulnerability. From a factor perspective, the sell-off was broad-based and largely indiscriminate: momentum (-8.5%) and small caps (-7.9%) underperformed, while minimum volatility (-5.4%) held up on a relative basis. Value (-6.4%) and growth (-6.7%) moved in broadly similar fashion, suggesting a generalized de-risking rather than any thematic rotation. The primary transmission channel for the shock was energy. WTI crude oil prices surged an exceptional 51.3% over the month, reflecting both an effective reduction in supply flows and the pricing-in of a substantial geopolitical risk premium. In currency markets, the dollar benefited from the risk-averse environment and the rates differential, strengthening against the euro (EUR/USD -2.2%) and, to a lesser extent, against the renminbi (USD/CNY +0.5%). The yen displayed more volatile behavior (USD/JPY +1.7%), reflecting its traditional safe-haven role alongside the specific dynamics of the Asian context. Finally, non-energy commodities showed divergent patterns: gold posted a significant correction (-11.6%), an apparently counterintuitive move in a risk-off environment, but entirely consistent with the sharp rise in real yields, which weighed on its relative attractiveness. The fund recorded a negative absolute performance, falling short of its benchmark over the period. Both sector allocation and stock selection detracted from returns.

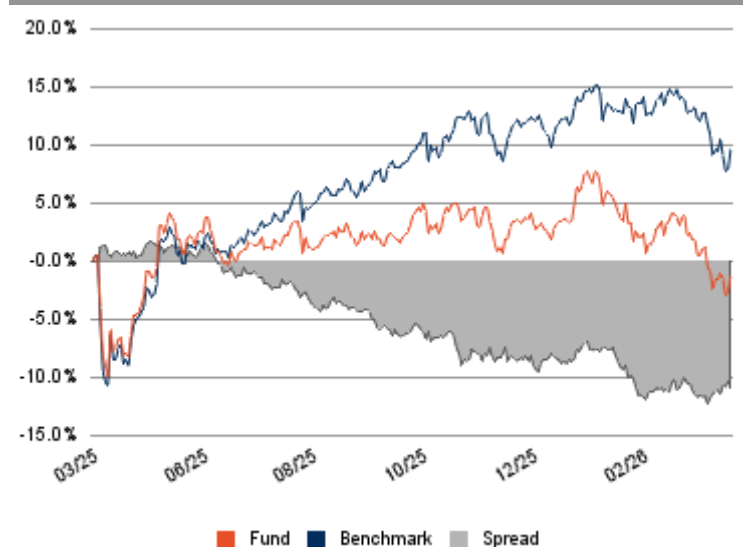

Equity portfolio structure

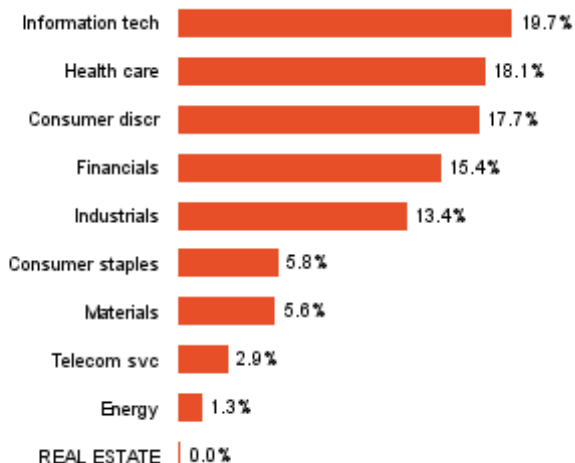

Performance over last year

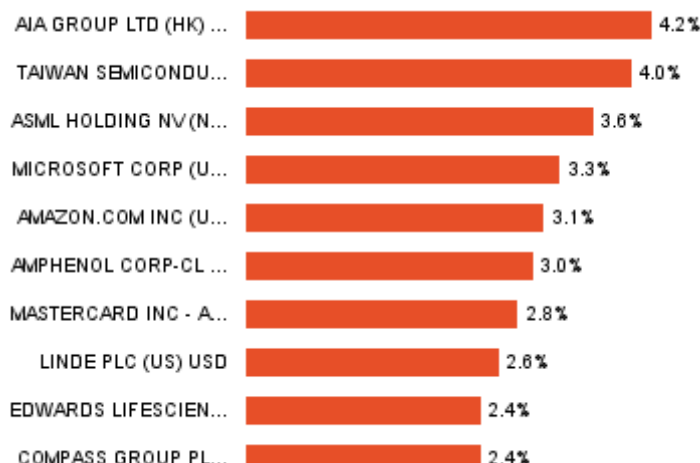




Composition by sector

Investment objective

The sub-fund primarily invests in equity instruments denominated in euros, US dollars, and Asian currencies, targeting issuers located in the European Union, North America, and the Pacific region. Investments span companies with varying market capitalizations and liquidity profiles and are diversified across all economic sectors. The main objective of the sub-fund is long-term capital appreciation (typically over an investment horizon exceeding five years) with a high risk profile. The investment philosophy is rooted in fundamental analysis, both at the sector level and at the level of individual companies. Accordingly, investment decisions are based on research focused on earnings prospects, valuation metrics, cash flow analysis, and risk management, with technical analysis playing only a secondary role. Portfolio management has been delegated to Walter Scott Partners Ltd., a Scottish asset management firm established in 1983, recognized for its strong track record in global equity markets.
